A lot of people are afraid of change, but everything in our lives was new at one point. Everything you have ever done was something you had to try for the first time at some point. I strive every day to be the best version of myself, but I feel like we never stop learning. There is an unlimited amount of knowledge, and it only grows every day. As knowledge expands, so do my goals. I want to write books. I want to make movies and shows. I want to own business. I want to build Long Sword Style into a great brand. Where do you see yourself in 5 years?

I like to leave some of it up to the listeners' interpretations. I want you to be able to dance to my stuff but also be able to have deep conversations about it if you choose to. A lot of pop-rap doesn't make you think enough and a lot of underground rap doesn't make you dance enough. I am bridging that gap.

What legacy do you want to leave behind?

It all comes back to working on myself every day to become the best version of myself. I genuinely want to help as many people as I can. I want to do as much good as I possibly can in the amount of time I have on this planet. I want to be one of the greatest artists that have ever existed. I don't mean this in terms of sales. I mean in terms of creating a discography free of filler tracks. I want all of my songs to have real meaning and artistic value. That's what my career has been about from day one. Living life in zero gravity. Living without any earthly problems weighing you down. It is about living without limits and ascending to the highest version of ourselves.
