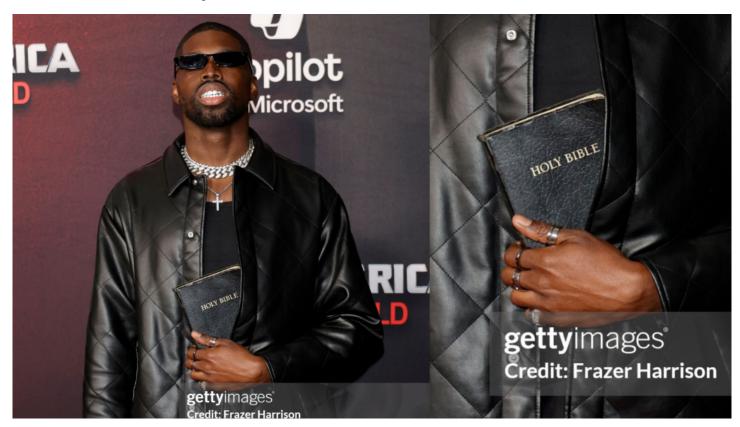
WriterBoy Walks the Red Carpet with the Holy Bible at Captain America: Brave New World Premiere
